Message From The Executive Director

We stand at a precipice. For the first time in two decades extreme poverty has risen in the country due to the impacts of climate change compounded by COVID-19. To step back from the precipice and halt the decline from communities where we work, VAD must come up with an effective agenda to reduce inequality, poverty and climate change.

This is what we did this year, VAD tackled the root causes to end poverty, lack of access to safe water, sanitation and hygiene services, limited access to education opportunities, income, health and effective service delivery in the most vulnerable communities in Uganda. In the past year we scaled up to go further than ever before. We supported more than 96,727 beneficiaries with various services including improved access to WASH, livelihoods, access

to finance, education and health.

The platform for these efforts and achievement during the past year has been our new and recently launched strategic plan. We are driving innovation through cooperation, supporting teams to adapt and improve, employing both proven and new approaches to achieve greater impact. Most profoundly, the reach and delivery of our work is made possible because of the commitment of our staff who care deeply for our clients and build strong bonds of trust in the communities where they live and work.

The support and strong partnerships with our donors and funders particularly Just A Drop-UK, Signpost International-UK, Aid Link-Ireland, Friends of Uganda-Germany, Danish People's Aid through UWASNET and the dedication of board members assured us that we can continue to bring fullness of life to vulnerable communities in Uganda with opportunities to thrive even when hope was seemingly fading due to COVID-19 ravaging of the planet and human kind overall over the world.

On a sad note, I would like to bring to your attention the death of our board Chairperson Mr. Elidad Mukasa Ssebale who succumbed to COVID-19. May His Soul Rest in Eternal Peace. On the same note I would also like to introduce to your Mr. Fred Katongole who is the newly appointed Board Chairperson. He comes in with a wealth of experience and dedication to serve the organization and steer it to new heights.

We hope you are inspired and will join us as we seek to go even further than we have ever imagined together.

Message From the Chairperson

2021 has been a truly challenging and historic year, with the onslaught of COVID-19 and so many crises converging at once. Almost nine out of ten of Uganda's children were out of school because of the pandemic. A country hunger crisis put about 1.5 million people on the brink of famine across the Northern and Eastern parts of Uganda, millions were thrown out of employment, business collapsed and millions were thrown to abject poverty. At the same time both communicable and non-communicable diseases put the country's health sector at the standstill due to breakdown in the supply chain of medicines, limited access to safe water and sanitation, breakdown in the communication system to mention. Further still, the breakdown in the economic situation saw millions of the both voung people and women totally unemployed.

However, VAD has been there throughout, keeping hope alive. Our staff across the two regions have empowered girls and boys, women and men and the vulnerable communities of Uganda to press for change in their own communities, amplifying their voices to be harder

for better service delivery. The achievements against this challenging backdrop have been remarkable. Even in the midst of COVID-19, we reached more than ninety six thousand (96,727) people in need of WASH, health, education and economic empowered services.

I am honored to take up the role of Chairman Board Governors for Voluntary Action for Development to lead a group of dedicated and distinguished men and women to steer the organization to new heights amidst new local, national and global challenges.

We cannot do this alone but partnerships remain key to our work. From our incredible volunteers, donors, international partners, local and Central Government in communities where we work to beneficiaries of our work throughout the country, these spectacular results we have achieved together are in plain sight in this report. The amazing work done by our VAD staff and family is truly inspirational and I thank you all from the bottom of my heart.

Key Achievement for the Year 2021:

Over the last year, we have been able to reach a total of 96,727 beneficiaries which included school children, farmers, households, patients, teachers, SMT and PTA members directly with WASH services, health, livelihood services and improved access to education services through our projects across the three districts of Napak, Kapelebyong and Wakiso. 





FINANCES Incomes, sources, expenditure and accountability




